A dance with dragons part 2 after the feast pdf download

Books (UK) Amazon Spectra4r5[US][1] A dragon dance is the fifth seven-story novel in the American author George R. R. Martin's A Song of Ice and Fire fantasy series. In some areas, the paperback edition was published in two parts, titled *Dreams and Dust* and *After the Feast*. It was the only novel in the series to be published during the eight seasons race of the HBO adaptation of the series, *A Game of Thrones*, and runs at 1,040 pages with a word count of almost 415,000. The American hard cover was officially released on July 12, 2011, and a few weeks later it went to #1 on both bestsellers Publishers Weekly and USA Today lists. The novel was adapted for television as the fifth season of *Game of Thrones*, although the elements of the book appeared in the third, fourth and sixth season of the series. The Wall and beyond Stannis Baratheon, a suitor of the Westeros Iron Throne, occupies the Wall at the northern border of the kingdom, having contributed to reject an invasion of the savages from the northern desert. Stannis performs Mance Rayder, the leader of the savages, to refuse to submit to him, and marches his army south to seek support in his bid for the throne. Jon Snow, the newly elected Lord Commander of the Night's Watch, orders that defends the wall, prepares defense against others, inhuman hostile hostilities from the extreme north. Jon negotiates with the wild leader Tormund Giantsbane to let the savages overcome the Wall in exchange for their defense assistance. This translates into a fragile peace but creates disorders between the clock of the night, which have considered the savages their enemies for centuries. Stannis' counselor, Margaery, warns Jon that his half-sister, Arya Stark, is in trouble. Margaery turns out to be alive, thanks to the magical deception of Melisandre. He is sent to the ancestral castle of the Starks Winterfell, now occupied by the enemy Boltons, to save Arya. However, the girl in the visions of Melisandre turns out to be Alys Karstark, a young noblewoman fleeing the Wall to escape her infidels. To protect Alys and help the integration of the savages into Westerosi society, Jon organizes for Alys to marry Signor of Poin, a wild leader. Jon receives a letter from Ramsay Bolton, who claims he crushed Stannis' army in Winterfell. Arya and Jon Theon Greyjoy's foster brother, the last two that Jon hasn't seen in years. Jon decides to march on Ramsay himself and asks the volunteers to accompany him. His officers consider Jon's intention to march on Ramsay as a betrayal of the neutrality of the watch and is stabbed in a mutiny. Meanwhile, Jon's half-brother Bran Stark, who travels north of the Wall, is brought to the last children of the forest, the nonhuman natives of Westeros. They introduce Bran and his companions to the "last greenseer", an ancient man interwoven with the roots of a weirwood tree. Help Bran learn clairvoyant "greensight", allowing Bran to testify the past and present through the eyes of the weirwood trees growing all over the North. Through the North Sea in free cities after killing his father Tywin, the king's hand, the north Tyron Lannister is smuggled from Westeros to Pentos by the spy Varys, where it is repaired by the merchant Illyrio Mopatis. Tyron is sent to the south with a party in an obsessive way to help the exiled prince Daenerys Targaryen, who controls the only living dragons, supporting the Iron Throne. Tyron discovers that Varys and Illyrio hid the alleged-dead Aegon Targaryen, son of Daenerys' brother, Prince Rhaegar, and intend to install him as King of Westeros with the help of Daenerys. Tyron persuades Aegon to invade Westeros immediately, without waiting for Daenerys. Soon after, Tyron was kidnapped by the unfortunate advisor of Daenerys Jerro Mormont, who intends to deliver him to Daenerys to regain his favor. In the free city of Braavos, Arya is an acolyte of the guild of murderers known as the faceless men. When she afflicts her temporarily with blindness, Arya develops her sense of hearing, and realizes that she can "see" through cats the same way she could with her desperate animal, Nymeria. After his sight is restored, Arya is charged with assassinating a corrupt trader while magically disguised with another girl's face. After doing this, Arya is declared apprentice of the faceless men, to be sent to another murderer to continue his training. Slaver Daenerys' bay has conquered the city of Meereen and banned slavery, but struggles to maintain peace among the various factions within the city, including the Children of the Arpie, a group of violent Meereenese resistance, and the neighboring city of Yunkai. Daenerys' dragons have become increasingly dangerous, and she confines them with reluctance to a prison for the safety of her people. Drogon, the largest, evades captures and flies away. Despite his sexual intercourse with the mercenary Daario Naharis, Daenerys marries the nobleman Hizdahr zo Loraq from London to secure an alliance to placate the Sons of the Arpie. Quentynson of the prince of Dorne in the south of Westeros, arrives in Meereen in the hope of restoring the alliance between Daenerys and his, but he can't keep his attention. Jorah and Tyron are shipwrecked, kidnapped and sold to a Yunkish slave trader. Tyron escaped the Yunkish army by besieging Meereen, joined the Second Sons mercenary group and secured their support for Daenerys. Meanwhile, Victarion Greyjoy, sails for Meereen, intending to marry Daenerys and use his dragons to overthrow his brother, the Ironborn king. In Hizdahr, Daenerys reopens the city's "pikes of struggle" for gladiatorial combat, but the noise and complexion attract Drogon. In the resulting chaos, Daenerys climbs up Drogon to calm him down, but flies away with her. Hizdahr is implicated in an attempt to poison Daenerys. His advisor, Barristan Selmy, removes Hizdahr from power, and the Sons of the Arpie take back their killing. Barristan prepares for battle with armies outside Meereen. Quentyn tries to prove his value by riding one of the remaining dragons, but is killed and both dragons are released. Drogon flies Daenerys to the sea of Dorthaki, the prairie controlled by the nomadic Dorthaki people. After several days, Daenerys meets a Dorthaki herd led by Khal Jaqo. In the Seven Kingdoms The North In the North, Roose Bolton overthrow House Stark and assumed authority as the North Guard after allied with House Frey. Most of the region is occupied by Ironborn invaders. Under Jon Snow's advice, Stannis wins the support of the northern mountain clans asking to win Winterfell and fight against Ironborn. With their support, Stannis captures Asha Greyjoy, Victarion's nephew, and rots his forces towards Winterfell to attack the Boltons, but his advance is blocked by heavy snowfall. Stannis' advisor Davos Seaworth is sent to win the support of the wealthy Lord Wyman Manderly, who pretends to perform Davos to cling to Lannister's regime The Iron Throne. In a secret meeting, Manderly tells Davos that he and other northHe intends to plot the Boltons and Lannisters while plotting revenge for Robb Stark's death and restoring the Stark rule. Revealing Davos that young Rickon Stark is hiding on the remote island of Skagos, Manderly is committed to supporting Stannis if Davos manages to recover Rickon and join the Starks supporters around him. Theon Greyjoy is a prisoner of the Boltons, and is mutilated and tortured by the sadistic son of Roose Ramsay, who renamed Theon "Reek". To cement his rule on the North, Roose allegedly married Ramsay with Arya Stark, but the girl is actually Jeine Poole, a friend of Arya Sansa's sister, who is forced to impersonate Arya and is physically and sexually tormented by Ramsay. A Mance Rayder disguise comes to Winterfell and joins Theon to help him flee the false Arya. Theon and Jeine escape, jumping from the castle wall in the snow to be captured by Stannis's forces. The uncle (and, secretly, father) of the young king Tommen Baratheon, negotiates the surrender of the last of the allies of Robb Stark, officially ending the war of Stark-Lannister in Flanders. Brienne of Tarth, who Jaime had sent for Sansa Stark, finds Jaime and tells him that Sansa is in danger. He follows after her. After Tyron convinces Aegon to attack Westeros, Aegon and his forces capture several castles in the Stormlands with little resistance. Meanwhile, Aegon's adoptive father Jon Connington is secretly succumbing to a gray scale, a deadly and infectious disease. Doran Martell, Prince of Dorne, sends three of his grandchildren north to King's Landing capital to infiltrate the Faith and Government and work in Dorne's interests. Cersei Lannister, mother of Tommen and queen regent, was arrested by the Faith in charge of fornication and conspiracy. To get his release from his prison, he confesses to several of the minor charges against him, but he does not confess that he killed her king KingBaratheon, neither his children are the incest product. As a condition of his release, Cersei is forced to humiliate himself walking naked through the city. Meanwhile, Cersei's ally, former Maester Qyburn, has created "Ser Robert Strong", an eight-foot figure carved in armor, to be an unbeatable champion in the next fight Cersei process. After taking control of the government, Cersei's uncle, Kevan Lannister and Grand Maester Pycelle attempt to cancel damage caused by Cersei's error. However, Varys reappears and kills both Kevan and Pycelle, revealing that he plotted for years for Lannisters to destroy himself so that Aegon Targaryen can take the throne, having been elevated to be an ideal ruler. The book ends with Varys sending his spies to finish Kevan. Extra In addition to maps published in previous books, the book includes a new map of the previously unmatched area of the free cities of the eastern continent. Like the previous four volumes of the Ice and Fire series, the book includes an appendix with a full list of characters. Characters The story is narrated from the point of view of 18 different characters,[4] including two minor (POV) characters present in the prologue and in the epilogue. [5] Both POV characters were identified before the book was released. In the North: Prologue: Varamyr Sixskins, a leather moulder and one of the wild survivors north of the Wall. [6] Jon Snow, the 998th Lord Commander of the Night Watch and son of Eddard Stark. Bran Stark, his brother's legitimate heir, the deceased Robb Stark. Looking for an old power beyond the Wall, believed dead by his own family. Davos Seaworth, former smuggler and king's hand at Stannis Baratheon. Reek, the Prince of Winterfell, the Turncloak, a ghost in winter. Theon Greyjoy, son of king balon greyjoy of irona prisoner of Ramsay Bolton and now tortured, deceived and just dead. Wayward's bride, King's sward, sacrifice: Asha Greyjoy, grandson of King Euron Greyjoy of the iron islands, fled from the iron islands after the coronation of his uncle. Lady Melisandre, a shadow of Asshai and a devout priestess to the red god R'hllor, councilman of Stannis. In the eastern continent of Essos: Daenerys Targaryen, heir of the Targaryen dynasty who ruled Westeros for 300 years until their deposition 15 years before the first novel. The queen of Westeros, self-proclaimed, now governs the city of Meereen. Tyron Lannister, Nono and uncle to King Tommen of Westeros, a fugitive wanted for kinslaying and regicide. Recently fled the Seven Kingdoms. The Merchant man, the Windblown, the Spurned Suture, the Dragontamer: Quentyn Martell, the eldest son of Prince Doran Martell of Dorne, traveling to the East on a mission for his father. The Lost Lord, the Griffin Reborn: Jon Connington, one of the king's former hands at Aerys Targaryen and one of Prince Rhaegar's closest friends. Exiled and falsely believed dead. His identity as a narrator was kept secret during the pre-release process of the book. Queensguard, the discarded Knight, Kingbreaker, Queen's hand: Ser Barristan Selmy, former Lord Commander of Robert Baratheon Kingsguard, and the first Queensguard of Daenerys. The Iron Suitor: Victarion Greyjoy, captain of the iron fleet, recently went on mission to find Daenerys and use it for their own ends of Ironborn. The Blind Girl, the Ugly Little Girl: Arya Stark, who is hiding in the Free City of Braavos, where he assumed the identity of the "Cat of the Canals" and continues his training as a murderer from the House of Black and White (The Faceless Men). In the south: The Watcher: Aroa Hotah, guard of the captain of Doran Martell. Ser Jaime Lannister, the Renslayer, Lord Commander of the Kings Guard; currently occupying the landsRiverrun. Cersei Lannister, iRregent, currently imprisoned in a tower cell, waiting for process. Epilogue: Ser Kevan Lannister, head of House Lannister in light of the death of his brother, and current regent of King Tommen. His identity as a narrator was kept secret during the pre-release process of the book. The chapters for several POVs, which may include Sansa Stark, Samwell Tarly, Aeron Damphair, Arianne Martell and Brienne of Tarth were written for the book, but instead they appear tentatively in the next book, The Winds of Winter. A dance with dragons was originally intended to be the title of the second novel of the sequence, when Martin had just imagined the series as a trilogy. Some early U.S. editions of A Game of Thrones (1996) list A Dance of Dragons as the next second volume of the series. The 1998 Anthology Legends, which presents the novel The Horseman of Siepe of the same universe, listed A Dance of Dragons as the third episode of a series of four books. In May 2005 Martin announced that the "size of the bladder" of his manuscript still unfinished for A Feast for Crows had brought it and his publishers to divide the narrative into two books. [10] Road to publication Despite the original and optimistic predictions of possible completion at the end of 2006, Martin completed the novel in April 2011, almost five years later. During this period, Martin's blog had sporadic updates on his progress, and in January 2008 he published an update stating his vigilant commitment to ending the novel. [11] At the beginning of 2008, publisher Spectra Books (a division of Random House) announced that A Dance with Dragons would be released on September 30, 2008.[12] but Martin declared that it would be possible only if he had finished writing by the end of June, before his trip to Spain and Portugal.[13] It did not meet his goal. [14] On February 19, 2009, Martin posted on his website: "I'm trying to finish the book by June. I think I can. If I do, a dance with dragons will probably be published in September or October." [9] On June 22, 2009, the author expressed "guardian optimism" regarding his progress on the novel, although not confirming a date of[1
