Report 2024: RCA Graduate Careers Reveals High Job Satisfaction RCA offers various graduate diplomas: MA, MArch, MEd, MFA, MDes, MRes, MPhil, and PhD degree programs in art and design disciplines. The institution emphasizes student employability, with at least 80% of graduates employed in their preferred field. The course structure includes four assessed units, supported by teaching events such as personal tutorials, group critiques, lectures, workshops, inductions, and external public-facing events. Students engage in independent practice and research throughout the program. Unit 1: UN-MAKE:RE-MAKE focuses on studio-based making and critical reflection. Unit 2: COLLABORATIVE PRACTICES for Common Good explores cross-disciplinary research and knowledge exchange. Unit 3: CONTEXTS emphasizes contemporary art practices, while Unit 4: PUBLICS prepares students for public dissemination and presentation. Teaching events include individual and personal tutorials with designated tutors, providing opportunities for sharing ongoing developments and receiving feedback. Getting direct feedback from tutors, Group Crits and Tutorials provide opportunities to share work with peers and test it in studio spaces. Practice Events (Units 3-4) develop curatorial strategies in a group context, offering practice experience in curation through collective endeavour. Research Events are tutor-led sessions exploring shared research interests and developing focus for Research Papers. Lecture and Seminar Programmes contextualise and broaden practice and references throughout the course. Postgraduate lectures offer regular debates and discussions with contemporary issues, while visiting artist lectures and specific Fine Art seminars expand knowledge. Open Studios (Autumn term) allow students to share work-in-progress with a public, developing self-organisational skills. A special Open Studio takes place at the end of the academic year for first years, providing an opportunity for a small exhibition. Workshops and technical inductions support introduction to Art Programme facilities, encouraging independent engagement with designated spaces. The course emphasises self-organisation and co-operative working, providing opportunities for collaboration and co-operation in various projects. Exhibitions and public-facing events are crucial, including Interim Show (Spring Term, Year 1), Editions (Autumn Term, Year 2), and the Final Show (Summer Term, Year 2). These events depend on collective participation and offer direct experience of commercial enterprise through the creation of prints for sale. Final Showcase activities for students are held after the final assessment and provide an opportunity to showcase work publicly. The format and location vary annually. MAFA students can participate in various elective and mandatory projects throughout the year, including international collaborations, exhibitions, and research opportunities. These projects help expand and develop their practice. Students are encouraged to engage with external opportunities but must inform their tutors and ensure it doesn't affect their course participation. It's essential to note that retaking a unit may require ceasing further study and could impact student loans or visa status for international students. The MA Fine Art course is offered in an extended full-time mode, requiring 30 hours of study per week. The course is designed to accommodate part-time employment, internships, or care responsibilities while still attending scheduled teaching days. To complete the course, students must achieve 180 credits and pass all units. The classification of the MA degree is based on marks for the third and fourth unit.
