However, despite the fact that you can transfer your vehicle title, you are not allowed to transfer your Ohio car tags to another person. If you choose to obtain new registration plates for your new car instead of transferring your current car tags, you must surrender these old credentials to the BMV. Once you pass your knowledge and vision test to get a TIPIC, you can take your receipt to your local DMV office and purchase your temporary license for \$22. [4] You will have to bring documents that prove your full legal name, your date of birth, your Social Security number, Ohio residency, and citizenship or legal presence in the United States. You have 60 days from the time you pass your knowledge and vision test to purchase your TIPIC. Your temporary license is valid for one year. [5] If you are under 18, you will need to bring a parent or guardian with you to the DMV and get their written permission in order to purchase your TIPIC. Your TIPIC comes with restrictions. If you have a TIPIC, you can only ride during daylight hours, cannot have any passengers, cannot ride on interstates or congested roads, have to wear a helmet and eyewear while riding. 8. Practice your motorcycle driving skills with your TIPIC. With your temporary license, you can practice your motorcycle riding and driving skills for up to one year. You should practice as much as you can so that you are prepared for the driving test. 1. Schedule your skills test. Once you feel like you are ready to get your motorcycle license, you can schedule a skills test at a driver exam station online, in person, or over the phone. If you are under 18, you will have to have a probationary driver's license, have your TIPIC for 6 months, complete a driver's education course, and complete a motorcycle education safety course before you can schedule your skills test. 2. Bring your TIPIC, a helmet, eyewear, and a road legal motorcycle. You'll have to show your instructor that you have your temporary license before you can begin the test.
