The second paper (25% of the final mark) tests your listening skills: you will need to be able to understand announcements and other slow spoken materials. The third paper (25% of the final mark) will focus on your speaking abilities: you will need to take part in a conversation by answering and asking simple questions. You will be face to face with one or two other candidates and two examiners. Two versions of the KET test There are two versions of the KET: the A2 Key and the A2 Key for Schools. Deciding which one to take is fairly easy: it depends on how old you are. The two tests are almost exactly the same, the only difference between the two tests is the targeted audience. The A2 Key is designed for teenagers or adults, whereas the A2 Key for Schools is aiming at school-age learners. This difference has consequences on the content of the test, but not on the format or on the level being tested. The two versions certify that you are an A2 level English learner.
